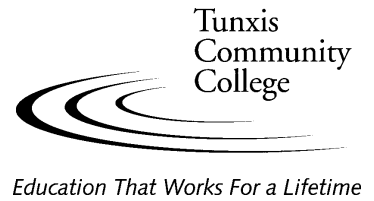

<b>Catalog Course Description:</b>	An introduction to the standard practices of screenwriting. Students will analyze cinematic techniques and character and plot development in films and screenplays. Students will practice writing in an accepted screenwriting format and share their work in a workshop environment. Students will write treatments, "pitch" project proposals, and create storyboards that visually communicate their ideas to others. Prerequisite: B- or better in Composition or permission of Department Chair
